

Enhancing Access to Justice in Maryland

The Maryland Access to Justice Commission was created in 2008 to expand access to and enhance the quality of justice in civil legal matters. The Commission works to address the barriers Marylanders encounter when they try to get help with a legal problem.

The Commission has 45 members including judges and Judicial Branch leaders, representatives from the legal services community, legislators and key Executive Branch partners. The Commission is chaired by **Judge Irma S. Raker** (Court of Appeals, ret'd). Chief **Judge John Morrissey** (District Court of Maryland) serves as the Vice-Chair.
